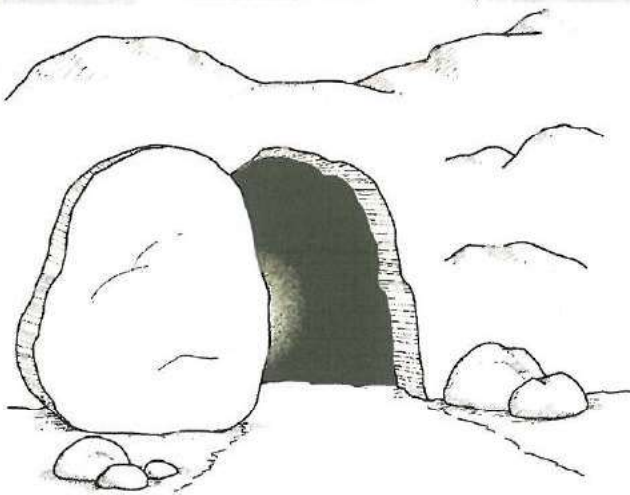

Vicar's Letter

Dear friends

A colleague on the point of retirement has been clearing his large rectory in preparation to move into a small retirement home he likes to call his 'man-cave'. Like many of us, he lives amongst clutter accumulated over many years. What to keep, and what to save? There's nothing quite like moving house to force decisions.

In all my adult life, I have (until now) never lived anywhere longer than four years; I now realise this used to help me to stay relatively clutter free. However Lawrence and I have now lived in our present home for twice that, and already it looks more like one of those house-clearance junk shops than a show-home. Of course when we married 8 years ago we brought with us the accumulated 'stuff' of two households; and since then we have added many daft purchases at auctions (what made us think we needed a dented copper bugle?) mementoes of our holidays (including a truly horrid pottery cicada complete with electronic chirruping sounds) and the contents of my mother's and my daughter's houses, still feeling too precious to part with - even those awful yellow 'pouffes' from the 1960s I tried so often to persuade my mum to throw away. I seem powerless to sort things out.

However in talking to my colleague, I admit to being quite inspired. He told me about a book he has been reading, titled "The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up" by Marie Kondo. Apparently it is full of great tips for decluttering and re-organising, but one phrase really caught my attention. As my colleague described it, the author says that we should take each object in our home in our hands and ask the question, 'does this spark joy in me?' If the answer is 'no', then out it goes. Nothing must be kept for any other reason.

Springtime is traditionally a time of cleaning and decluttering not just our homes, but our hearts and minds. Often we seek to live a simpler lifestyle by giving up wine or chocolate for Lent. I wonder if instead we could take that principle of discarding whatever does not spark joy in us? What might we get rid of? Perhaps anger and revenge, bitterness and cynicism would all have to go. Out with sneering, criticism, gossiping. Selfishness and greed would have to go too. Wouldn't it be great if we could just get a big skip and throw all these things in? We'd all walk away feeling cleaner, lighter and happier.

I'm going to have a go at decluttering both my home and my heart this spring. I do hope you'll give it a try too.

CARE OF THE CHURCHYARD

Our churchyard is kept in good order by regular working visits from supervised teams of people doing Community Payback Service.

But individual graves should be cared for by relatives and friends of those who are buried there, and there are just a few rules to help with general maintenance. These apply to all graveyards, (except the ancient parts), and include the need for all grave surfaces to be level and with grass growing that can be mown (i.e. no shingle or slate) and (apart from ancient graves) there should not be any raised borders. Also, with the exception of new graves and children's graves (for which there are special regulations), only flower tributes and plants, or 'silk' flowers in season, should be left on graves. Seasonal tributes may be left at Christmas and Easter, but as Easter is now approaching, we do ask that Christmas tributes be removed.

A special area of the churchyard is marked off to be left unmown so that wild grasses and flowers can grow undisturbed throughout the Spring and Summer.

We can tell it's **Springtime again** because there is so much evidence of God's Creation. The bulbs we planted at the end of the summer last year were dry and hard, and gave no sign of life at all. All winter long they have lain in darkness, incarcerated in a tomb of earth. Today as we travel around we gaze on a **scene of exquisite beauty**. Our playing fields are a wonderful example of **God's creation** and confirm the fact that **Spring has once again sprung**. As we journey to Mildenhall, on our way to work or to the shops, there cheering us on our way is a glorious display of magnificent yellow blooms swaying in the breeze. Perhaps not as beautiful, but a **marvelous example of workmanship**, was the sight of the sperm whales being washed up on our beaches, not many of us could have failed to be moved by that sight! Many other creatures and plant life are also showing signs of **early Spring**.

David Boag, a wild life photographer, said "The way a work of art is created often reflects something of the person who created it. All of **creation** reflects **something of God's character** as if **He put a little bit of Himself into everything He made.**" As he travelled the world taking his pictures he said: "I can see **His majesty** and size in the mountains, especially whilst the sun is setting; and as I see a field mouse, feeding on seeds, I can see **God as the Provider**, **His love and care** as a bird tends it's young, and **His beauty** in the flowers of gardens and hedgerow - I am **filled with wonder and awe**". Colossians 1 v 16 says "**For by Him were all things created**".

Spring is the time of resurrection. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is one of the most well-established events in history. It is also a miracle far more wonderful than the return of life in the Spring. And most of all, **He has promised resurrection** to all who put their trust in Him. Over 2,000 years later **His resurrection** still gives meaning to life here and now. Not only is the **risen Saviour the Creator of physical life**, Col 1 v 16, **He is also the originator of new spiritual life because of His sacrificial death and His triumph over the grave.** Jesus said in John 11 v 25, "**I am the Resurrection and the life**". As we see new life bursting out all around us, **let us rejoice in Christ's resurrection.**

The new garden waste only service will cost £40 a year for a bin. This charge covers your collections between 4 April 2016 and 31 March 2017. The new service will continue to use your existing brown bin.

To guarantee you do not have any breaks in your service please sign up by 22 March 2016 (but you can join the scheme at any time).

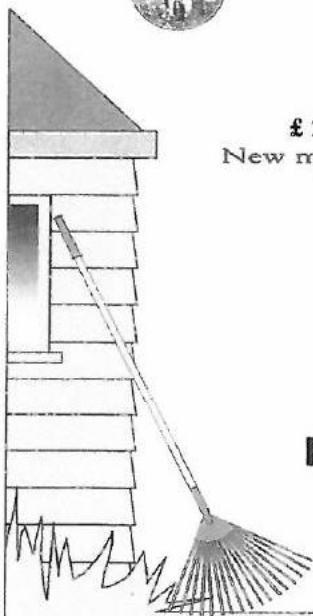

THE PRESERVATION TRUST CORNER

Welcome to the regular new page for the Trust, where we hope not just to keep you reminded of current events but also to share snippets from the history of the Church.

Our Lady of Walsingham



Above the South Porch entrance of St. Mary's is the niche that sets off the (modern replacement of a much older) statue of Mary herself holding the baby Jesus. This is not just 'any' depiction, however.

In 1061 Richeldis de Feverches, a noblewoman from Walsingham in Norfolk experienced a series of apparitions of Mary. To honour this she had a chapel built, and this eventually housed a wooden figure of Mary and Jesus carved in Oberammergau, Germany.

Over time the chapel became viewed as a shrine and thus Walsingham – now also the site of a priory - grew to be one of the great sites of Christian pilgrimage in Britain.

With the coming of the English Reformation, everything changed. The carving itself was carried off to London on the 18th July, 1538, and eventually burned. The buildings in Walsingham were destroyed. The memory of the image itself remained, however, and the composition and pose of the figures were reproduced in many places – including in the statue above the door of St. Mary's, Barton Mills.
